## Clarify Expectations

Collaborating with your fellow students can be prohibited - or encouraged - depending on the assignment. Be sure to read through assignments carefully and ask your instructor for clarification.

## Focus on Time Management



The most common excuse that students use for cheating is that they ran out of time to complete an assignment. Get in control of your time by keeping a calendar, planning ahead, getting plenty of rest, setting up a functional workspace that limits distractions, and rewarding yourself after meeting your study and work goals.
